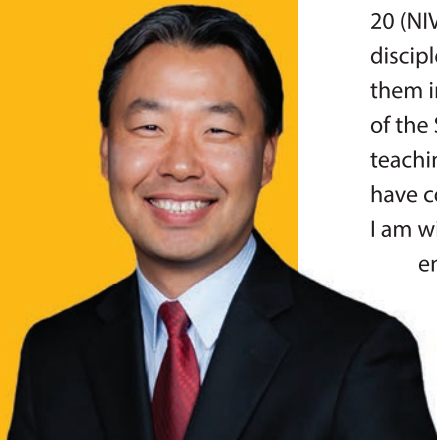
Our mission is often referred to as The Great Commission. Some have also said it has turned out to

LLUC Implements Shower Trailer in Homeless Ministry

During the pandemic, Loma Linda University Church (LLUC) had an influx of visitors seeking access to showers and essential hygiene products. LLUC realized that many of the resources for individuals experiencing homelessness were no longer available. They sought to address this deficit by creating a ministry that brought care directly to the homeless. The shower trailer project, spearheaded by Israel Peralta and Ian Poujoul, developed from this desire.

UReach, LLUC's outreach department, has several ministries, including Meals on Wheels, transit, tutoring, a thrift store, and a cafe. The shower trailer is a part of the ReNew Clinic, the branch of UReach's ministry dedicated to their homeless neighbors. The clinic provides haircuts, hygiene products, clothing, diapers, no-fee ID applications, résumé help, military dog tag replacement, food, and an array of other services. The shower trailer is open at San Bernardino Spanish church and at Crosswalk church twice a month. LLUC also partners monthly with Kansas Avenue church and San Bernardino City Senior Center monthly.

This ministry is volunteer-dependent. Before engaging with the guests, volunteers complete the required background check and training. UReach's priority is that each visitor has a safe and positive experience. When setup and registration are complete, each guest can visit the station that best fits their needs. The priority is to ensure that everyone gets a clean and safe shower. The shower trailer serves approximately 90 people each month.

UReach believes that members of the homeless community should have their

needs met. They aim to ReNew not only the bodies but also the souls of all the people they encounter. They consider it a blessing to share God's love by addressing the practical needs of their community.

"This ministry has changed me because I have seen Jesus in the faces of the people we serve, and it's a constant reminder for me to love others as I would want to be loved and to serve others as I would want to be served," said Linda Mendez, pastor of outreach at LLUC.

She gladly accepted *Steps to Christ* and said, "This is the very book I need! Thank you so much!"

Chang was convinced that God had divine appointments waiting for each of those who listened for His direction.

Gabby Mendoza shared that each morning she would pray that God would lead her to the people who needed spiritual help. She discovered that God was faithful and would open the way to the right person needing help.

Mendoza met Tina, who had been diagnosed with stage 4 cancer and had been given four months to live. Her experience of having cancer resulted in a closer relationship with Jesus. Mendoza was impressed that even though some may go through the valley of the shadow of death, they can still have the assurance that God will always be by their side.

The young people were blessed as they participated in a faith journey each day and watched the Lord open doors to meet the very people that needed their books and prayers.
